Change is Needed and the Time is NOW!

Africa is continually called a dying continent, a dark continent, a corrupt continent. The chaos of Africa demands leadership that can see beyond the now into a preferred future that has the courage to inspire a new generation to strive for change.



The Bible tells us in Ecclesiasts Chapter 3: that there is a season to everything and a time for every purpose under heaven. The word of God goes on to say that there is:

A time to be born, And a time to die.

A time to plant, And a time to pluck what is planted.

A time to kill, And a time to heal.

A time to break down, And a time to build up

And so on...

The word "Time" has two meanings in the Hebrew language: Time as quantity of time that is lapsed, which is *Chronos*. It is duration of time which may be a point, a lapse, a period, a stretch, a quantity, a measure or a length. This *chronos* tells what day it is, it suggests kind of time, and it tells of special happenings occurring during the time frame of *chronos*. It compares chronology, chronic or chronicles.

This time we all know about. We can change *chronos*, we can switch it around we can even miss *chronos* and catch it up later. We can schedule *chronos* and master that time. You can be early or late with *chronos* and still be OK.

Chronos is the kind of time you can manage stretch or resume and still miss nothing much

For instance, you can invite me to your home for dinner, and after looking at my agenda I can tell you, "I am sorry I will not be able to attend the dinner that evening. I am working on a speaking engagement. Can we schedule it for next week?" With *chronos*, it will be fine.

There is another kind of "time" defined as quality of time that is appointed which is *Kairos*. *Kairos* is a due time, appointed time, opportune time, definitive time, or a seasonable time. It is a proper time for action.

This kind of time is not in your reach. You can't manage it, it can't be stretched and it can't be scheduled. This is a time, once missed, it is gone. It can't come back twice.

A couple times in the Bible we read that It came to pass, in the process of time, that the Lord remembered ... My question is can God forget? Surely the answer is No.

This brings me to talk about God and His timing.

To better illustrate my message, I would like to share two Bible stories of people who experienced God's timing, *Kairos*.

In I Samuel 1: The story of Hannah is a true fit of the description of the time I am talking about. "It came to pass in the process of time that Hannah conceived and bore a son..."

This is the "*kairos*," the appointed time, a due time, opportune time, definitive time or a seasonable time. It is a proper time for action.

Genesis Chapter 8 talks about the Lord remembering Noah. This shows that there are certain periods of time that we go through seasons of waiting and silence. Only the Lord is the master of *Koiros*. He is the one who opens doors which no one can shut and the one who shuts doors that no one can open. (Isaiah 22:22).

Like Hannah, I know deep in my heart that the time is coming when we will see the glory of God all over the Continent of Africa. Restoration and revival is coming because God's focus is on African now. My concern is Do we know it? Do the African people know that the *kairos* moment is here?

By grace I am aware of this glorious time and my commitment is to awaken you. Do not miss this moment. It is the due time, the definitive time. We need change and the time is now.

It is also difficult to lead people whose hearts are divided by hatred from tribal conflict and different mind sets.

"We have found a secret". She said. "we take all our everyday challenges to Jesus who said Come to all me you who are tired and bur-

dened and I will give you rest... This way we have found peace of mind in midst of turmoil and are able to lead the people God has entrusted to us with confidence knowing that the Lord is leading with us"

She shared with us about the love and responsibility they have toward orphans, The fellowship and worship services held every Sunday evening in the palace with His Excellency, the president Pierre Nkurunziza, leading the palace's choir.

Why Rwanda?

As you know the country of Rwanda is recovering from the horrors of 1994 in which according to the Rwandan government about one million people were roughly killed during a hundred days.

The atrocities of 1994, indeed throws a dark shadow over the accomplishments of mission and church in overall.

Rwanda is generally regarded as one of the most “Christian” countries in Africa and the World.

It is said that Rwanda is one of the real “successes” of Christian missions in Africa! The statistics shows that 80% to 90% of the population are Christians or regard themselves as. The majority are Roman Catholics, and a strong minority Protestants.

The Rwandan genocide and its effects have affected even the neighboring countries though Rwanda herself is in process of bringing peace and reconciliation to her people. During the preparations of the genocide the behavior of the people went against everything that the Christian church stands for and preaches. Both the victims and the murderers belonged to these Christian churches. It is hard to understand what happened to these “good Christians”

“In my own experience when I was growing up, I used to see well-dressed neighbors walking to church on Sunday morning, but to my shocking surprise these same neighbors woke up one morning and slaughtered one another.

In the history of Rwanda, Tutsi people were cattle farmers, and Hutu people were Agriculturalists. I still can't admit that the same tools that were used to bring forth the crops to feed us were turned against one another, they were used to kill us where the guns were not distributed.”

The question is :

- * Where were church leaders?
- * Did the church preach responsible Christian living?
- * What can be the role of the church now and in the future?



„I heard someone saying that “The Rwandan case may just be *Act One* of a long, repulsive melodrama, perhaps we are sitting on time bombs and dormant volcanoes!”

John Maxwell said that everything rises and falls on leadership. True! In most of countries of Africa leadership has been corrupted and the results are right before our eyes.

Rwanda has paid the price for deliverance of many of her neighbors. It is not a mere chance that what happened in 1994 just happened, There is a purpose for everything

"The Journey Back home"

About a Month ago I landed at the International Airport in Kigali Rwanda (April 21, 2008). It was a deep shock, a mixture of emotions. I was a little confused by my feelings. I wanted so much to be happy by what I was seeing, all the good work by many good and precious people, but deep in my soul were old memories that have haunted me all these years. I kept telling myself, "You can do this. Just hold your head high and move as if nothing has happened. Try to be like one of these visitors. You can make it..."

To my surprise, at that moment, I felt the wind and smelled the soil and a window was opened in my memory. I could see clearly what happened 14 years ago. I remembered how I left the Country. The scars on my body began itching.

My eyes were blinded by my tears. While I was trying to clear my eye glasses, the team I was directing became aware of my condition. They were so sweet and supportive.

We drove through the town and the beauty of the "New Rwanda" was unspeakable.

Occasionally I would forget that we were in an African country recovering from war! The Rwandan authorities have done so much in a decade that it became hard for even me to find my way around.

We stayed in a beautiful small hotel, "Chez Lando," which is situated about five minutes from the airport and two minutes from the "Evangelical Restoration Church." For three days we went back and forth to the airport trying to find out anything about our luggage which had been left in Washington D.C. We had nothing but our purses.

Apostle Yoshua and the Evangelical Restoration congregation brought us pajamas, T-shirts, and body wash... just a few things while we waited to hear from our travel agency.



We received most of our things on Wednesday evening, but our five trunks of training supplies were still missing. We had to reschedule our visits to the training centers while waiting for the trunks to arrive.

Early Friday morning, we headed toward the northwest of the country where we were able to visit two villages: Kiramuruzi and Nyagatare. In these villages we met with pastors and Christian and non-Christian women.

I will never be able to describe their welcome, love, and care in the midst of so much despair.

In both villages, the women are very active and supportive of the community and their homes. In Kiramuruzi, Future hope for Women gave away three new sewing machines to a hundred women. We hope to find more machines in the very near future in order to provide job skills training for more women.

Eight women on a journey to bring Help, Hope and Healing to women survivors of war and violence. The first trip to Rwanda "April 2008".

We sat down among these incredible women they shared with us their lives, their struggles...

We shared with them hope and encouraged them to look to Christ who is the author and finisher of our faith. The God who sees, who care He is faithful to rescue them and heal them everywhere they hurt.

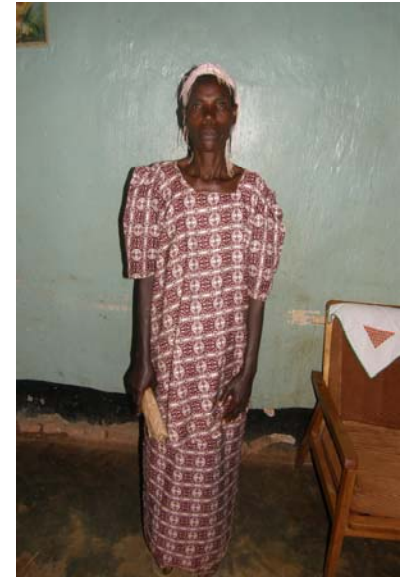

In Nyagatare, we met Pastor Fred Nshimye and Pastor Theoneste Biseruka . The church is half finished. They don't have chairs, but they are happy and proud of what has been done so far.

On Saturday April 26, we visited different associations of women recovering from prostitution in the City of Kigali. They have testimonies! We spent some time listening to them speak from their hearts, encouraging them and doing hands on projects with them like beading and making soap and candles.

Sunday April 27, I spoke in the great Evangelical Restoration Church. The title of my message was “God's timing”. I shared with the congregation about my journey to America and the experience of being in America. It was so moving to see people listening intently as I recounted some of my adventures and the mistakes that I had made, while trying to adjust to my new country and culture.

On Monday, April 28, I met with a lawyer who is taking care of The African Global Mission. This is an organization that my husband Leon and I co-founded to raise awareness and provide funding in order to train indigenous pastors and missionaries to reach Africa. The lawyer and I worked on how to extend our activities in Rwanda and other operational duties for African Global Mission (AGM).

On Tuesday, April 29, Rev. Stevens and the entire team returned to the States.

That same afternoon I met with many pastors from different denominations at the invitation of Bishop Yoshua. We spoke about the vision of AGM and explored different ways to reach church leaders and provide training.

So far my journey has been a success (being busy keeps me from digging in my memories). However, I would like to have a few days alone facing my past in order to make peace with it, that way I will be set free from these painful dark memories."

Many books have been published with big titles and pictures of Africa, a dying Continent, a Dark Continent, a Corrupted Continent...

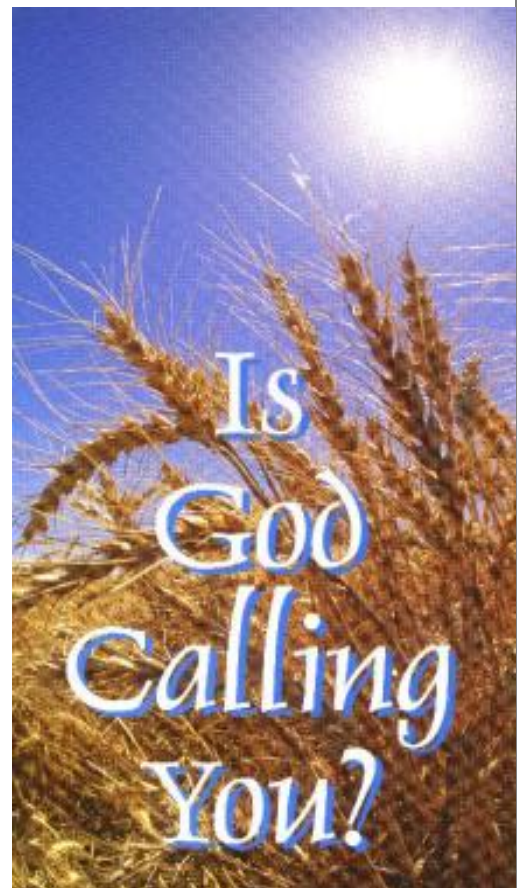
Humanitarians are rushing to Africa every year with help and strategies to save the dying Continent. But why is Africa going backward after all these efforts have been made?

I was struck by the way she mentioned that she is a stranger, just like the others on the team. Those who have not heard Dr. Brigitte's story may not realize that when she fled Rwanda in 1994, her husband and two daughters were the only family she had that made it out alive. All of her siblings were killed. Sometime later she found out that she had a niece and nephew who had survived and were in a refugee camp. Because she did not have any documentation to prove their relation, the children had to be left behind when Leon, Brigitte, and their girls fled to the USA. A couple of years later the same refugee relocation group that brought the Kitenge to the U.S. was able to reunite the children with their aunt. The young man is currently pursuing a degree at a college in Tennessee. The young woman is happily married and has a beautiful baby girl.



Just imagine returning to the place where you grew up and feeling like a stranger. There was a time when she was young and all was good with the world. A time when she carried lunch to the workers in the field. As she passed homes she called out a greeting, the response was "good morning Mimi" (a childhood name). On the weekends she would lay in bed drowsily waiting for the warm fragrant smell of baked sweet potatoes, that her grandmother was so skilled in making. As she grew there were plenty of hard times, but just before the world went crazy, her life was great. She was one year away from finishing a degree in international law and she had a beautiful new daughter. She and her husband were held in high regard by their neighbors and their four year old was a continual blessing. How many times have you longed to revisit a place that was sweet and safe?

Pray that she will connect with these happy memories and bring back new stories for her family of hope and healing.

Setting the captives free is the mission of the church. This department of African Global mission is intended to fulfill that mandate by equipping women and young girls to rise to the level of understanding of their role and place in the body of Christ as well as ministering and bringing healing to those who have been "abuse," and "sinned against".

In most situations, the offender is guilty and sometimes condemned; surely some of them will eventually repent. What about those offended? Those sinned against?

They are the broken and wounded trying to connect with the world and God but yet they are not able to forgive or to repent from what happened to them.

There is freedom in forgiveness. Forgiveness is a double door; one side closed to the past and the other side opened to a great future. Helping a person who has been offended yet has not reached the place called "forgiveness" is like covering an infected wound without cleaning it. The results are stinky odors that are released every time the wound is uncovered. This wound will never heal, instead it will deepen and the chance to heal will decrease as time goes by.

I am one of the many women who under went abuse, rejection, and everything that goes with it. For many years I lived in a shadow and the only power I had to face every day's challenges with was "HATRED."

It has been proven that "Love" heals and hatred does kills. When, by the grace of God, I became aware of the love of God for me in midst of these hard moments, I made a choice to make peace with my past. I closed the door to hatred and moved into a place called forgiveness, and love healed me. Today I can look back many years and see the unseen hand of the Lord uncovering my stinky wounds and bandaging them with love and forgiveness.

Healing is a process that requires patience and commitment. I wish I can say that I held onto God through these nightmares, but the truth is that God held me tightly. Someone once said that "a hero is one who knows how to stand a minute longer." I didn't know what to do many times during my journey and one day I made a poor choice to "end my life." I decided to attempt suicide. I failed but I know many fellow sisters who succeeded and are gone forever. I am not proud of what I went through but I am proud of what God is doing with what I went through to strengthen many lives. When I see the scars on my body, I see the work of the evil one; but moreover I see "GRACE" springing through each of my scars. Instead of cursing and grieving as I used to do, I bless my torturers and praise God for his deliverance! I carry with me the "EVIDENCE" of God's deliverance, restoration and grace, **MY SCARS!**

Raising up a generation that will take us through the end time revival is a very needed mission. It is so crucial not to ignore the needs that our young people are facing and challenges surrounding these needs.

I remember when I was a very young woman about to finish my secondary school. I had so many great dreams and I was so ambitious, but I lacked a mentor! I couldn't find a person to show me the right way to go. This situation didn't keep me from dreaming for the better future. I committed myself to keep my dreams alive as long as I live.

I made many mistakes trying to find a way to fulfill my dreams, and I wonder how much easier it would have been if I had a person to look to, a person to show me the right thing to do! I made my way in life with pain and the fear of tomorrow, but thank God, for He saw me through!

I was about twenty three years old when the genocide war began in my country, Rwanda. I woke up in the midst of the horrors in which I lost my family members friends, neighbors and my dreams and ambitions. I saw how the enemy used the young generation to fulfill his plan. The militias that we talk about were not animals or Bushmen. These were young men and women in churches and in our communities. Most of them were under the age of 30 years old. They are the ones who received the instructions and all the training to kill their neighbors. The commanders were planning and the orders were given to these young people. I am always shocked to even think that today's leaders do not understand that there is a force hidden in our youth. If we don't use it for the glory of God, this unused power will be used against the work and the mission of the church.

African Global Mission is committed to raise up a generation of leaders of tomorrow, leaders who will cross over and take Africa to a dimension that is beyond ethnicity, tribal, religion and racism.

Feeding their hungry souls with the truth, training them to fear God and serve Him devotedly.

We must always seek first the Kingdom of God, learn what it means to rest in the move of God, and allow our calling to emerge and begin to walk in it with fervency. If we stand doing this, the critical spirit will not have an affect on us. We will begin moving away from the things we are in bondage to. Although we can expect to encounter jealousy and critics of the work, we must always respond with love and humility; interceding for the church and crying out divine interruptions and divine encounters. We are living stones of brokenness. By being broken, we are prime candidates for a move of God. We need to see ourselves as forerunners or pioneers. Those who are settlers do not always like pioneers. Settlers like to settle into a position, or become passive. Pioneers are always on the move and settlers can become very critical of anyone stirring the waters. The Lord is asking all of us to die to our flesh and not inter into any gossip or slander. If we do not learn this, we will be hindered from walking in our destiny. It's going to take every bit of faith to endure. Like those in the book of Nehemiah, we must build with one hand and keep a sword in the other. Attacks will come and we must be ready. Refuse to let criticism or opposition hinder you. Many people who love Jesus will be critical of you. They are wounded or blinded people. As you pursue healing, you will experience more freedom, and the easier the building will be (Romans 12: 1-2)

As we seek the manifest presence of God, and as He begins to dwell within us, we will be able to endure anything because the manifest presence of the Lord is with us. We must resist the fear of man. We need to position ourselves in Jesus and emulate Him so that when people see us. They see Him through us. We are all in the process of being pruned. If we are to be of any spiritual significance in our region, the pruning must take place. The greatest answer to any criticism will be a completed work.

Your methodology must be intimacy with Jesus. Our bylaws are these two: Love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, soul and strength, and love thy neighbor as thy self. When we get those two rights, then we will start on some more. We should be free-moving spiritual beings, not locked into a system, but a kingdom. Most leaders are activity or productivity oriented. Without it they are at a loss. The Kingdom of God should be a supernatural movement. Will we be

Prepared when all hell breaks loose in the region? If we do not enter into the rest of God and know that He is in control, we will begin to move in selfish ambition.

Organization and structure are good, but it can stifle the spontaneity of the Holy Spirit.

Many principles that are used in traditional church are from the business world, and they cannot be applied to the supernatural work of God. The church needs to be a supernatural body.

We are so honored to be a part of this end-time movement. One goal of this movement of God is to teach everyone, including ourselves, to hear the voice of God, to be a voice of God, and to be led by the Holy Spirit. We do not want to be led by unrenewed thinking. We are asking for a lifestyle that radically walks out this mandate. God is asking more of us now than ever before. It is a priority that we must maintain unity at all cost, to be of one accord, and to be equipped and released into the ministry. We do not want to be so close to Jesus that we are an example of who He is wherever we go. Evangelism will be easy when we are reflecting the Son of God. Another goal is that we walk in healing and salvation and use our gifts wherever we go. When we do this, we will begin to give the enemy problems and become dangerous to the kingdom of darkness.

Real pioneers and forerunners do not criticize other pioneers and forerunners because they know how hard it is to get to that place, because we have been there. We must be about building and not destroying. The new wineskin is coming.

There are obstacles to a new wineskin. It is a different environment than what we know. It is a different spiritual culture than what we are familiar with. We must believe for God's power and anointing. We are not healed for a casual encounter, but a shaking and trembling that comes from the fear of the Lord. Get your house in order, God is purifying us all. The fear of the Lord is coming! The fear of the Lord is coming! The enemy will try to frustrate us, and he is good at that.

Don't enter into personal judgments of others or you will be judged. This new movement will anger the world and the religious system. We must get ready for it. Will we give in, or stand firmly? We are not meant to be an institution of convenience. Our gatherings are not held for people's convenience, but God's purposes. God did not call us to casual Christianity; He called us to move the Kingdom forward through spiritual violence. We must maintain the radical edge for Jesus and carry our authority lightly (in humility). We do not have to make anything happen, and it may take time to go through the process. When we know it 's God's work, then we work the work that God has directed us to do and we cannot go where we need to go unless we are fully engaged and working as a team. We do not want to be grounded in the natural, but in the supernatural. Remember, we are taking burnt stones to build the temple.

Some of what we have experienced in church leadership has been out of insecurity and a lack of renewal of the mind. We need safe and secure leaders who find their identity in Him and Him alone! This is an uncivilized Christianity, moving in the paradox of bold leadership, overflowing in love and humility "The lion and the Lamb" "A steel fist with a velvet glove"

Brigitte was born and raised in Rwanda, the small country of thousand hills. She lost her Father at a very young age in an automobile accident and lost her Mother by a natural death. She is one of seven siblings, but lost her siblings and relatives during the Rwandan genocide war of 1994. She had a rough childhood. As an orphan growing up she was adopted by different families, but the worst was yet to come.

After Secondary School (High School), she met and married one of her professors who is originally from the Congo in 1988. She enrolled in Law school at the Mburabuturo University in Kigali/Rwanda, which was her dream, but the war of 1994 interrupted her dream and she woke up in the midst of the horrors of genocide. The genocide war was between two tribes, Hutu and Tutsi. She went through persecution from both sides, but miraculously escaped the killings. She says, *“I hopelessly begged mercy for my life and got*

They arrived in USA in September 2000 carrying their four daughters and a big vision. The Lord spoke to them to see themselves as missionaries and not as refugees.
